Dear Church:

This summer I will be taking a planned sabbatical for which I am truly grateful and appreciative.

A sabbatical is an intentional time for a pastor to rest, reflect, and renew. The theme of my sabbatical is regeneration, with a focus on four different areas:

1) Regeneration with God. In the words of the psalmist, I plan to be still and listen. While I participate in daily Biblical study and reflection for the weekly act of preaching, I am acutely aware that preparing to preach is not the same as daily devotion. During this sabbatical I intend to set aside specific time each day for prayer, journal writing, and Biblical reading. I am also planning to take an online course by a renowned theologian that focuses on centering prayer and two separate personal retreats at Vision of Peace Hermitages.

2) Regeneration of self: physical health. The movement of the body relates directly to the neurons of the brain, anchoring us deeper into our own grounded reality. Movement of the body leads to a deeper realization of the self. I plan to engage in a regular routine of fitness, learning along the way how, through physical well-being, humans are infinitely adaptable and malleable. Such recognition will, in turn, transform the composure of my heart and soul.

3) Regeneration of family. I look forward to spending time with my wife and children, along with visits to my parents and other relatives. The success of a pastor is strengthened (or weakened) by the relationship one has with others, especially family. I want to grow these relationships so that, in times of busyness and stress, I know that our love will remain strong.

4) Regeneration of church. I intend to use all of the above to help strengthen Community Christian Church for the future. Looking forward to the years ahead, I want to model, as a servant-leader, the disciplines of spiritual study, physical activity, and family relationships. In conjunction with all of this, I also want to focus on the future of our community garden—an act of regeneration in itself. I love seeing the smile on a person's face when they taste for the first time a home grown tomato right off the vine. And I know that as our community garden continues to expand, both in physical size and

number of participants, I need to gain additional gardening/farming skills. I hope to do this through volunteering one day a week this summer at Loving Roots Urban Farm—a local business that focuses on growing fresh vegetables through organic processes for the health of the community.

My final Sunday before beginning the sabbatical is May 23rd, which happens to coincide with the Day of Pentecost. It should be a lovely day with special music and celebration. I will be back in the pulpit on the Sunday of Labor Day Weekend. And then, we will have a large "Fall Kickoff Sunday" on September 12th.

In my absence, John Yonker and Jody Clegg will cover preaching responsibilities on Sunday mornings, along with attendance at necessary committee meetings (Core Leadership Team, Finance, Elders and Worship). Jody will cover the final Sunday of May. John will cover the following six Sundays, and Jody will cover the remaining Sundays.

For non-emergency pastoral visits, such as prayer before or after surgery, the elders are available. For pastoral emergencies, such as a death or serious illness, John or Jody will be available.

I have also shared with the CLT and Elders that in the event of a funeral I would like to return and officiate. The desire to be present for a funeral is a bit of an anomaly for a pastoral sabbatical, but I feel strongly that as your pastor God has called me to be with you in times of death and it would not feel right to absent in such moments.

There will be, as always, lots of events taking place at Community throughout the summer. The children's ministry is planning a special one day "VBS Olympics" on July 11th. The work in the garden, under the direction of Beth, will continue to flourish. And the many ways that Community is in the community will not pause.

I already look forward to returning in the fall and sharing with you some stories of my sabbatical.

Antonette Pereira Will Be 100 On May 2nd!!

Barely 5 feet tall, she is a force of a woman. The sparkle in her eyes is matched by her sharp memory, and excellent health. She straightens with pride when reminded of her coming birthday. "Me? 100? Imagine that". The nearly 36,500 days she has lived, to us is quite a phenomenon, but to Mom "it's just life"; she attributes it to the 100+ rope jumps she did everyday after school and continued well into her 40s.

Antonette D'Cunha was born in Goa, India at the end of WW1, when Goa was a Portuguese colony and the rest of India was a British colony. In the US, Warren Harding was in the White House. Although born in Goa, she lived much of her life in Bombay where she later married (Francis Pereira, 1942) in the middle of WW2, subsequently bore 2 sons, and saw the transition of India from a British colony to an independent nation.



Francis passed away in 1990 and Antonette moved to St. Louis that year. She started attending CCC with us and, except for Covid, could be seen in her pew every Sunday. In 1995 she became a US citizen and in 1997 she moved to Gambrill Gardens Retirement Community where at a mere 76 years old she was called "baby" by her new friends there. She is known as the "Rose Lady" at Gambrill because of the gorgeous roses she plants and grows outside her apartment window. Besides having the greenest of thumbs, Mom is also a terrific cook (Goan dishes of course) and loved to sew, knit, crochet and embroider. I say "loved to" because her hands and fingers just aren't as deft anymore (except with the TV remote!). Furthermore, at 76, "because in America you can do anything", she decided to take her first paying job ever. She worked at K-Mart up the street from Gambrill, retiring at 87.

Mom loves her family deeply and especially her 3 grandkids and 3 great grandkids. She has a 3 month-old great granddaughter she has yet to meet. And last year she danced with her grandson at his wedding in Houston; she wasn't quite as snappy as I remember as a little boy when she and my Dad used to jitterbug to Glen Miller's "In The Mood", but then she was 99 last year.

We wish all of CCC could be celebrating her day with us but due to Covid we will have to defer that to a more appropriate time.
