Dear Community,

I discovered a new show this week on HGTV, "Bargain Block."

The premise of Bargain Block is simple. Keith and Evan, a youngish gay couple, rehab run down houses in the city of Detroit. The initial costs of the homes they purchase are around \$1,000. Then, while living in the house, Keith and Evan make renovations and repairs. They try to purchase homes that no one else believes in. In a recent interview, reflecting on their work and his own life, Keith, who was disowned by his family when he shared that he was gay, said, "I kind of personify the houses. I was down and beat up and even my family didn't want me after I came out, but someone believed in me and I'm in such a better place now. The houses are the same. They just need someone to believe in them again."

While Keith is talking about a house, the same could be said for the church. Fixing, restoring, building, and renovating, that is what the gospel of Jesus and Community Christian Church are all about. Keith says that when they move into a house, selling them later at a reasonable cost for first time home buyers, "We...treat the houses like our children or a friend, and it gives them life. You walk through and find out all their ailments and get to work fixing them kind of like a doctor."

This year, we are working our way through the Gospel of Luke. Luke, according to tradition, was a doctor. It would be incredible to know the exact details of how Luke combined his life as a physician with his life as an author that told the stories of Jesus. My guess is that the two careers merged together naturally into one. While caring for the ill and offering medicine for the sick, I can picture Luke also sharing words of hope that he learned from Jesus: Do not be afraid; Your sins are forgiven; Weep no more; Stand up and walk.

All of us live in a body, a soul, a house, and a world, that needs repairs. And I'm grateful that CCC, and the teachings of Jesus, help us fix what is broken and mend what needs to be repaired.

# 2021 OUTREACH SUMMARY

We are thankful for your generosity during the various special offerings collected in 2021. The donations received were: Week of Compassion - \$1,226; Reconciliation Ministry - \$185; Pentecost - \$365; Easter - \$487; Thanksgiving - \$330, Christmas - \$230 and Christmas Eve - \$1,368.

Outreach from the 2021 budget in the amount of \$29,900 supported Pastor's Discretionary Fund, Caring Solutions, Circle of Concern, Alliance Q, Bethany Fellowship, Disciples Mission Fund, Christian Church of Mid America, National Benevolent Association, Isaiah 58 Ministries, Loaves and Fishes, Heifer International, The Salvation Army, 100 Neediest Cases, Memorial Boulevard CC Food Pantry, Week of Compassion and Global Ministries.

Permanent outreach funds of \$240 per quarter were sent to Heat Up St. Louis, (\$240), Cool Down St. Louis (\$240) and Centennial Christian Church Food Pantry (\$480).

Other outreach receipts totaling over \$5,700 supported Circle of Concern Holiday Adoption, Hanna Woods Elementary School, Isaiah 58 Ministries, The Salvation Army, and Urban-ReachSTL. In addition we received many gift cards, toy donations, candy, clothing and food donations and more throughout the year to support some of these organizations.

Priscilla Circle service projects supported Isaiah 58 Ministries, Family Village Farm Sponsor Child, Circle of Concern and gift cards for CCC college students.

Stable Ministry outreach of \$7,700 was sent to HELM, Caring Solutions, Isaiah 58 Ministries, Memorial Blvd. CC Food Pantry, High School Senior Scholarships, Global Ministries, Circle of Concern, UrbanReachSTL, Mid America Ministries, Bremer Memorial Garden and Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

Disciples Men Ministry supported High School Senior Scholarships of \$250.

We also are grateful for financial and volunteer support for the Bremer Community Garden. With your help we were able to share a variety of fresh produce with Circle of Concern, Caring Solutions, families of Hanna Woods Elementary School, CCC neighbors and our CCC church family.
