MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR MINISTER, REV. JACOB THORNE

Dear Community,

For as long as I have served as your pastor I have never openly taken a political stance in the pulpit and supported one candidate over another. And, hold your breath here, I'm not about to now. But I do want to address in this article the ways that kingdom and kingship in the Bible are addressed.

Throughout the gospels, Jesus warns his followers against the desire to be on the top of hierarchies. If you want to be truly great, he says, become a servant—wash people's feet, don't overestimate your own goodness, and seek first the kingdom of God. Jesus is never very vocal about being the kingdom's king. As a Jew, Jesus would have likely followed the notion of God's kingship—as proclaimed in the psalms. Overall, Jesus is more concerned with the ethics of the people as opposed to the kingdom's leadership structure.

But, there are passages that directly address kingship in the gospels and not in ways we might expect. For example, every year during the season of lent we study the passage in which Jesus rides into Jerusalem on a donkey. Jesus, from a political perspective, is an unkingly king. And what does it mean to be an unkingly king in today's world?

One answer might be found from the fifth-century African doctor, Augustine of Hippo.

Late in his life Augustine counseled Boniface, a Roman general governing the precinct of Africa. In a letter from 418, Augustine addresses Boniface's frustrations with uprisings from those who despise the Christian faith. Boniface thinks he knows what the kingdom of God is supposed to look like and wants to impose it, but Augustine cautions him to do so, saying, "We ought not want to live ahead of time with only the saints and righteous." In other words, we can't impose our will on others. Politics demands patience and the art of forging a life together, now, in the present moment.

This, I think, is the heart of what Jesus' teaching is all about. We shouldn't be shocked about deep disagreements among citizens—this has always been and always will be the case. Rather, as Jesus suggests, now is the time to work for the kingdom of God, together, serving with one another.

Here, at Community, this is what we do. We may not all agree politically, in fact I'm sure we don't, but we have found a way to make Jesus, and not politics, our guiding principle and light. For this, I am thankful and grateful.

The season of Advent, and perhaps on a deeper level time itself, is both cyclical and broken.


